Presbycusis, a Greek portmanteau of presbys (“old”) + akousis (“hearing”), is the process of losing your hearing over time. It’s an issue with a huge impact – one in every six adults in the US between the ages of 41 and 59 experience age-induced hearing loss, with that number ramping up to one in three people over the age of 60.

Signs of Hearing Loss: How You Can Tell | Clear Living

Causes of hearing loss include: Damage to the inner ear. Aging and exposure to loud noise may cause wear and tear on the hairs or nerve cells in the cochlea that send sound signals to the brain. When these hairs or nerve cells are damaged or missing,

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electrical signals aren't transmitted as efficiently, and hearing loss occurs.
